

## Dictionary entries for √lhits' with lexical suffixes

lhits' [√lhits'] cut, slice (get cut). (RP 30NOV82) na'ut lhits' tthu lutem.  
The table got cut (e.g., when something else was being cut on it).  
(RP 30NOV82)

lhits'ut [√lhits'-t] slice it, cut it. (CW 191174) suw' nem' tthu w'nilh  
swiw'lus sus 'uw' lhits'utus 'u tthey' smeent shuptuns. The young  
man went. ..and sliced it with his stone knife. (WS Eagle Story)

=t transitive

lhilhuts'ut [√lhits'-t-PROG] slicing, cutting it. (CW 201174)  
lhilhuts'utus tthu suplil. She is slicing the bread. (CW 201174)

### (1) INSTRUMENTAL SUFFIXES

lhuts'tun [√lhits'-ten] cutter; saw. (BC 24APR80A)

=tun instrument

lhuts'mun [√lhits'-mun] sawdust. (RP 161275)

=mun residue

### (2) BODY PART LEXICAL SUFFIXES

lhuts'tsus [√lhits'-tses] cut hand. (CW Fall/75) hilum kwthu shuptun  
nusni' 'uw' lhuts'tsus. The knife fell and I cut my hand. (RP  
30NOV82)

=tsus hand

lhuts'shun [√lhits'-shen] cut foot. (CW Fall/75) nilh lhwet tthu  
swuy'qe'allh ni' lhuts'shun. Who is the boy that just cut his foot?  
(RP JAN82)

=shun foot

lhits'a'qwt [√lhits'-a'qw-t] cut head off. (RP 22FEB77, 67)

=a'qw head

lhits'ulexut [√lhits'-ulexun-t] cut someone's arm, give someone a vaccination, cut wing of bird or cut a sleeve. (BC 7DEC79) nem' lhits'ulexut tthu shtl'pi'wun's tthun' men. Cut the sleeve of your father's shirt. (RP 0481)

=ul connective piece

=exun arm

some suffixes ending in *n* delete in before =t

lhits'enwust [√lhits'-enwus-t] cut someone's chest. (RP 4JAN80A)

=enwus chest

hwlhits'ust [hw-√lhits'-as-t] cut someone on the face. (RP 22FEB77, 89)

=as face

hw= is a prefix that gets added with some lexical suffixes, especially ones that reference a body part that is conceived of as a subregion of another body part, or as something inside the body

hwlhuts'qut [hw-√lhits'-qin-t] cut someone's tonsils out. (RP 14JAN80) nilh lhwet kwthu taktu ni' hwlhuts'qut kwthun' mun'u. Who was the doctor that cut your son's tonsils? (RP 15Feb82)

=qun throat

### (3) LEXICAL SUFFIXES REFERRING TO PARTS, LOCATIONS

lhuts'qst [√lhits'-qsun-t] cut the point off of it. (RP 14JULY80)

=qsun nose, point, end

lhts'eent [√lhits'-en-t] slice a piece off the end. (RP 161275)

=en end (ear)

lhuts'nutsels [√lhits'-nets-els] mow a lawn. (RP 18DEC81). (See also lhts'unup [√lhits'].)

=nuts bottom, down, on the ground

#### (4) LEXICAL SUFFIXES AND NATURAL WORLD

lhts'iwst [√lhits'-iws-t] cut up fowl. (RP 14JULY80) tuw' hwsxwumul' ch kwun's lhts'iwst tthu ma'uqw. You better cut the fowl up quickly. (RP 80B)

=iws body, water fowl, frogs

lhts'eenhwt [√lhits'-eenhw-t] cut top ends off (grain, canes). (RP 7JULY80) nem' lhts'eenhwt tthun' tsulqama'. Go cut the tops off your raspberries. (RP 80B)

=eenhw leafy plants, ferns

lhts'ul'tsup [√lhits'-ul'tsup] saw wood. (CW JUL91)

=ul'tsup wood

lhts'unup [√lhits'-unup] disk a field. (RP 28NOV79) ni' syekw' kws lhts'unups 'u kwthu shhwiiw'a'lum'. He was asked to go disk the playfield. (RP 18DEC81)

=unup ground

#### (5) LEXICAL SUFFIXES REFERRING TO CONFIGURATION

lhts'alust [√lhits'-alus-t] cut out an area of a weaving in order to reweave it. (RP 22FEB77, 87)

=alus eye, loop

lhts'alst [√lhits'-als-t] cut up potatoes, apples, vegetables. (CW 19NOV74, RP 17JUN80)

=als small sphere

lh̄ts'it̄th'e't̄ [√lh̄its'-it̄th'e'-t̄] cut into strips, slices, cubes. (RP 14JULY80, BC 7DEC79) nem' lh̄ts'it̄th'e't̄ kw̄thu sil. Go cut the material into strips. (RP 80B) nem' lh̄ts'it̄th'e't̄ t̄thu st̄eelhtun. Go slice the salmon. (RP 0481)

=it̄th'e' strips, slices, small pieces

lh̄uts'ut̄th'e't̄ [√lh̄its'-it̄th'e'-t-PROG] cutting it into strips, small pieces. (RP 14JULY80, BC 7DEC79). (Also transcribed as lh̄uts'ut̄th'e't̄.) yulh̄uts'ut̄th'e't̄ ch t̄thu kw'a'luhw. Slice the dog salmon. (RP 0481)

lh̄ul'ts'it̄th'e't̄ [√lh̄its'-it̄th'e'-t-PL] cutting a lot (of vegetables, fish) into small pieces. (BC 7DEC79)

lh̄ts'emut̄th't̄ [√lh̄its'-emut̄th'-t̄] cut across the grain, cut bullrushes to sizes, cut bullrushes. (RP 20JUNE80) yusul'iq'stuhw ch kwun's lh̄ts'emut̄th't̄ t̄thu st̄th'e'qun. Be sure to cut the bullruses the same length. (RP DEC81)

=emut̄th' long, broad, flat objects

lh̄ts'ule'tst̄ [√lh̄its'-ule'ts-t̄] cut open bales. (RP 3JULY80) nem' lh̄ts'ule'tst̄ kw̄thu saxwul' ni' l̄huqw. Go cut open the bales of hay that are wet. (RP 80B) lh̄ts'ule'tst̄ t̄thu ni' sq'eq'up' luxwtun. Cut the strings off the blankets (that are in bales). (RP 0481)

=ule'ts bale, bundle
